Takeaways:

There was a lot of positivity at this conference about SMRs. The most notable takeaways were:

Climate change is one of the key drivers for this nuclear vision. Utilities are seeking a source of clean dispatchable energy to balance out the growth in renewables

All of a sudden, it has become **cool to support nuclear energy.** One of the most memorable quotes was by Maria Korsnick of NEI who said, "We are transitioning from 'Not in my back yard,' to 'Please, in my back yard!'"

International growth: Considering the latest geopolitical challenges with China and Russia, the US has become a preferred partner for developing small modular reactors internationally.

Challenges:

Of course, there are challenges still to be overcome:

Due to the lack of recent construction activity the **supply chain** needs to be both developed and tested.

Regulatory approvals: The time required for a design to be certified continues to be a challenge. However, it's clear that the regulatory bodies are focused on applying recent lessons learned and streamlining the process.

We need **orders from several utilities** so we can take advantage of a factory build approach which will enable reduction of schedule and cost.
